Resolution 2006-01

A RESOLUTION SUPPORTING EFFORTS TO RESTORE

THE LOWER ST JOHNS RIVER.

WHEREAS, the Jacksonville Waterways Commission exists "to study and make recommendations to the Council with respect to the improvement, development and protection of the St. Johns River; to formulate an overall plan for dealing with any problems that exist concerning the St. Johns River; [and] to devise methods of developing future uses of the St. Johns River" (§95.105(a)-(c), Ord. Code); and,

WHEREAS, the Commission has been informed about the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency adopting total maximum daily pollutant loads for the Lower St. Johns River, and the Florida Department of Environmental Protection adopting a site specific alternative criteria for the same area. These regulatory actions were based on the best available scientific evidence; and,

WHEREAS, the Commission has also been informed about the objections to site specific alternative criteria raised by the St. Johns Riverkeeper, a private, not-for-profit membership organization dedicated to restoration of the St. Johns River; and,

WHEREAS, the Commission is aware of the many initiatives undertaken by private industry and government at all levels to reduce or eliminate pollutant loading to the St. Johns River; and,

WHEREAS, the Commission is also aware that The River Accord:

A Partnership for the St. Johns was recently formed. The River Accord is a 10 year, \$700 million program to begin restoring the health of the Lower St. Johns River Basin; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED by the Jacksonville Waterways Commission:

Section 1. Having received reports and having taken comments from City and state agencies as well as the public, the Commission supports improving the health of the St. Johns River through multiple initiatives. Those initiatives include improved mandatory standards for septic tanks; adopting an ordinance regulating the kind and use of fertilizers in Duval County; better funding for storm water treatment; implementing the Reclaimed Water ordinance (Chapter 752, Jacksonville Ordinance Code), continued expansion of the reclaimed water system in Duval County and the use of reclaimed water; and introducing and implementing amendments to the Zoning Code to control non-point source pollutant discharges to the river.

Section 2. The Commission believes that numeric water quality standards and site specific alternative criteria should be set at the highest levels that are scientifically supportable and consistent with law.

1 the Florida Department of Environmental Protection implement water 2 quality based standards in the Lower St. Johns River and allocate 3 pollutant loads to the regulated community, appropriate state, 4 federal and local agencies and qualified private entities should 5 monitor the quality of the water. Based upon the monitoring data, 6 the environmental permitting agencies should adjust the regulatory controls, or revise applicable rules, as warranted to improve the 8 health of the river. The Commission believes in striving for the 9 10 highest water quality standards for the river's health. therefore supports a higher dissolved oxygen standard for the river 11 12 and the most stringent nutrient reduction target or total maximum daily load in the Lower St. Johns River to address its nutrient 13 problems. 14 15

The Commission requests that the River Accord's Section 4. annual reports to designated recipient-members of the partnership (The Mayor of Jacksonville, the City Council, and the governing boards of JEA, the St. Johns River Water Management District, and the Jacksonville Water and Sewer Expansion Authority) be submitted

to the Commission for review and comment.
