PROCEEDINGS:

I. Welcome

Chair, Bryan Campbell, called the meeting to order at 12:35 and introductions were made around the room to include new members and guests. A quorum was established.

II. Minutes

George Sanders motioned to approve the minutes from September 4th, September 23rd, October 2nd and November 6th, Patrick McSweeney seconded the motion and it carried.

III. Ethics Presentation

Bryan introduced guest speaker Carla Miller, Director of the City of Jacksonville Office of Ethics, Compliance and Oversight, who gave a presentation with annual training on ethics. She discussed the Sunshine Law, public meetings, public records, public comments, gifts and other requirements of a government ethics code. The presentation slides are attached to these minutes.

IV. Let's Move Subcommittee

Tonisha Gaines explained that there has not been much information to add to the website; the next deadline for submitting metrics is 1/29/14. She recommends that the Let's Move Subcommittee meet on the week of the 22nd. Bryan asked about an announcement and Tonisha told the group about the press release issued from the Mayor's Office in early December highlighting Jacksonville's designation as a Let's Move City.

V. Direction to Subcomittees

Bryan commended the website launch and data submissions and said the next step is to identify the gaps in what the community has. He would like that to be the topic of discussion in the next Let's Move Subcommittee meeting, and discussed the importance of the process for moving forward.

VI. Seal Subcommittee

Bryan explained that the feedback from members on the initial designs was submitted, and a follow up meeting is needed. Patrick agreed. Feedback is attached to these minutes.

VII. New Business

Bryan discussed the presentation Winnie Holland gave at the last meeting and summarized Clay County Health Department's initiative for weight loss in Northeast Florida for those who were absent. Bryan also discussed similarity to the awards program and asked for feedback from the group on the MCFWB becoming involved with this initiative. Bryan disclosed that, with his professional role, he will have to be involved whether the MCFWB is or not. Dr. Audrey Wooten asked about where the MCFWB goes from here in partnership. Bryan discussed ongoing planning with the CEO of St. Vincent's in Orange Park and looking for a non-profit organization to lead and manage the program as well as hospitals and insurers to make small contributions for staff and supplies; staff would be needed to pursue grant funding. Bryan explained it is up to the MCFWB on how to participate and then he would propose it to Representative Jones and the Mayor to have a designee from MCFWB to the health departments' planning committee. The MCFWB also needs to consider whether to not do the awards or build the awards into that. Dr. Danielle White and Valerie Feinberg both agreed the program is aligned with the MCFWB. Bryan gave more information on the 1 Million pound challenge in Oklahoma City and explained reporting can be done through a combination of self reporting, group outreach such as with the YMCA and technology (mobile applications, SMS, etc.) The company which designed the website for Oklahoma City provides a customized community website for \$27K and can add other technological functions to the package. Dr. Ellan Duke recommended embracing the program and using it to help announce the Let's Move initiative. Patrick suggested a competition between Council Districts to lose the most weight. Tonisha asked about whether MCFWB support helps expanded the initiative from Clay County into Duval and Bryan explained that the kick off will be in Clay but the goal is to bring in Duval, Nassau, St. Johns, Putnam and Baker counties as well, and he has been discussing the plan with Dr. Wells from the Duval County Health Department. Bryan explained that an action is not required yet and Michelle Weinbaum will request a meeting with Mia or the Mayor for Brian to discuss it with them. Council Member Redman offered the possibility of introducing a resolution promoting the challenge through City Council and the group was appreciative. Dr. Laureen Husband requested that the MCFWB endorse the current legislation seeking to amend the Special Events Ordinance. Tonisha explained that the changes relieve some of the pressures organizations now have to provide certificates of insurance for both their organization and all vendors; if passed, the liability will be passed only to the organizer and the requirement for insurance companies to provide a waiver of subrogation will also be lifted. The revised ordinance will also further define what a special event is. Laureen added that a lot of small organizations have not been able to hold events

because of the current ordinance and there was discussion on whether the group could write a letter in support of the legislation. It was established that there was not sufficient time to draft and approve a letter prior to the vote at City Council. Alicia Hinte asked if CM Redman could verbally provide the MCFWB endorsement at the Council Meeting and CM Redman explained he could if the MCFWB voted on it and it passed. Alicia made a motion to have CM Redman express the MCFWB's support of the legislation, Patrick seconded and it was opened for discussion. Bryan asked if this exactly meets the MCFWB's mission and also if the language was available as most members had not seen the legislation before. There was some discussion of the need for a process for the MCFWB to follow on reviewing policies and legislation. Dr. Ellan Duke explained that the group should vote because, even without knowing the full parameters, it appeared to be in the best interest of the community. CM Redman explained that there had been no opposition in committee. Bryan requested a vote by name and also requested any public comments. Monique Ellis from the Florida Department of Health in Duval County expressed support for the legislation and the opening up for more healthy events. Tonisha added that this is not just for downtown but for any public property or event requiring a street closure. CM Redman reminded the group of how many schools, children's organizations, etc. have events and do fund raising at city parks. Members George Sanders, Jennifer Stein, Shaniqua Simmons, Pat Alexander, Bo McDougal, Ellan Duke, Danielle White, Bryan Campbell, Nancy Crain, Laureen Husband, Joseph Bergman, Audrey Wooten, Valerie Feinberg, Alicia Hinte and Tim Burrows voted in support. CM Redman and Tonisha Gaines abstained. The motion carried.

VIII. Public Comments

No one in the audience requested to make any additional comments.

IX. Adjournment and Next Meeting

The meeting adjourned at 1:37 pm. The next regular meeting of the Mayor's Council on Fitness and Well Being will be held Wednesday, February 5th at 12:30pm in the same location (Conference Room 851 in the Ed Ball Building at 214 N. Hogan St.)

• ALL Meetings are to be <u>open</u> and <u>accessible</u> to the public

Meet at City Hall or other "public location"

- Reasonable advance notice of the meeting (Staff)
- Written minutes of the meeting (Staff)

NO OTHER TALKING/EMAILING ON ISSUES!!

Public Records



Every document made OR received in connection with public business is to be made available for inspection & copying

Your "personal" laptop/emails/text messages/facebook



Regardless of what form it comes in,


cave drawing, smoke signal, carrier pigeon, telegram, handwritten/typed letter, email, text message, YouTube video, Facebook wall post, etc., if it concerns public business, it is a public record

What matters is the content--what is discussed in the communication, not the form it comes in.

DANGER AREAS



You accept anything of value over \$100 from someone for you <u>or</u> your family. (GIFT) Gifts from relatives OK!

You ASK FOR anything of value from someone for you, your family, your business associates or your friends.

you destroy public records (emails; text messages)

You vote on any matter which might benefit your family or your business associates.

You or your family try to do business with the City.

You have an employment or contractual relationship with a company doing business with the City.

You use your public position for the personal gain of you, family, friends or business associates.

Your Board doesn't allow public comment before you vote on an issue

You Take a Bribe "Quid Pro Quo"

CANNOT ASK OR ACCEPT ANYTHING BASED ON AN UNDERSTANDING THAT AN OFFICIAL ACTION WOULD BE INFLUENCED.

You talk with other board members outside of a noticed meeting (A Sunshine law violation)
