

Angella Beckom is an Air Force veteran and servant leader. She served as a non-commissioned officer for more than three decades culminating her career as the 12th State Command Chief Master Sergeant of the Florida Air National Guard. In this role, Angella represented the highest level of enlisted leadership and was the principle advisor to the Florida Air National Guard Assistant Adjutant General on all matters pertaining to enlisted Airmen. She was directly responsible for all matters influencing the health, morale, welfare, job satisfaction, discipline, utilization, family support, quality of life, and professional development of 1,900+ Airmen. She provided guidance and mentorship to more than 34 Chief Master Sergeants throughout the state. She served as the Enlisted Field Advisory Council Region 3 Primary where she represented the Airmen of eight states and two territories. In this role, she aided in proposing solutions, providing legislative/executive oversight, and recommended policy action to the Air National Guard Command Chief on issues and concerns impacting all enlisted personnel serving in the Air National Guard. Prior to becoming the State Command Chief, Angella served as the 125th Fighter Wing Command Chief Master Sergeant and the 125th Medical Group Senior Enlisted Leader. Angella retired in November 2025.

Angella holds an associate's degree in health care management from the Community College of the Air Force, a bachelor's degree in multidisciplinary studies from Liberty University, a master's degree in human relations also from Liberty University, and a Doctor of Health Science degree from Nova Southeastern University. Additionally, she has completed the Executive Leadership Program in Managing for Inclusion at Georgetown University and participated in the Air Force Enterprise Leadership Seminar at The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill's Kenan-Flagler Business School.
