

Florida's Ethics Laws



SECTION 8. Ethics in government.—A public office is a public trust. The people shall have the right to secure and sustain that trust against abuse. To assure this right:

- (g) there shall be an independent commission to conduct investigations and make public reports on all complaints concerning breach of public trust by public officers or employees.
- (h)(1) A code of ethics for all state employees and officers prohibiting conflict between public duty and private interests shall be prescribed by law.

Davis said selling the certificates was "entirely handled for the convenience and benefit of the people."

He contended it was not part of office operations, even though the certificates were sold by county employees during courthouse business hours.

Asked if he saw anything wrong, questionable or illegal about using county employees in an operation that amounted to a private and personal business, Davis said he did not.


"You can be assured that if I saw anything wrong, I would not be doing it and my employees would not be doing it if they thought that anything was wrong with it," he said.

Ethical Decision Guide

ASK FIRST, ACT SECOND:

- Is it legal -- does it violate state law or City ordinance? If you're not sure, consult with the Ethics Office.
- **Could this create a problem for the City or the citizens you serve?** Even legal actions in the "gray area" can destroy public trust and ultimately hurt your Board/Commission.







What is covered by the Sunshine Law?

- Any communication
- Between two or more members of the same board
- On a matter that could possibly come before your board in the future
- Has to be in a "noticed meeting" able to be heard by the public

Sunshine Law—Requirements



Meeting requirements:

- Must be open and accessible to the public; quorum must be present in person
- Must properly notify the public in advance (best: 7 days prior)
- Must take written minutes
- Always Include Opportunity for Public Comment (Preferably before major votes)

Sunshine Law—Meetings Accessibility

Meetings have to be accessible to all citizens, including persons with disabilities

- If you are handing out materials, work with Disabled Services division to ensure they are available to people with different needs.
- Meeting rooms should be set up so anyone can enter the room.





<u>All</u> Meetings are Covered by Sunshine Law

- Committees and Subcommittees
- Workshops
- Two or more board members in a planning meeting

Activities and Communications Prohibited by Sunshine Law



- Phone, email, texting
- Social Media
- Tours
- Using liaison or staff as go-between

Matters That Could Come Before Your Board



Determined by:

- Jacksonville Ordinance Code or
- Executive Order(s)

But NOT:

- By-laws/Rules
- Legislation

Sunshine Law—Hybrid Meetings

Boards can host hybrid in-person & virtual meetings if some board members cannot attend due to "extraordinary" circumstances:

- Must have quorum physically present in City building
- Board votes to determine if the excuse is an extraordinary circumstances
- Persons attending in-person meeting must be able to hear and understand board members/public attending virtually
- Must provide public comment, regardless of in-person or virtual

Sample Extraordinary Circumstances

Extraordinary Circumstances may include but are not limited to:

- The COVID-19 pandemic;
- Other health related issues;
- Military duty or deployment;
- Extraordinary family obligation;
- Unforeseen mandatory business obligation; or
- Previously scheduled unavoidable conflicts.

Sunshine Law—Public Comment



Legally

 Required to provide opportunity for public to speak on specific issues BEFORE official action is taken.

Public Opinion

- Best to allow comment immediately before the vote on a controversial issue.
- Best to allow general public comment during your meeting.

Sunshine Law—Activities and Communications Allowed



- You CAN send articles or information to board members if no response
- Best Practice: Send through staff to avoid accidental response



- You CAN talk about board business any time with staff or members of other agencies
- You CAN talk to board members about topics that NEVER could come up before your board (sports, the weekend, your family, television ...)

Prohibited Gifts



- Primary gift restriction:
 - Anything over \$100 in value, or \$250 in a year, given by a vendor, lobbyist or someone employing lobbyists
- Other gift restrictions (No \$ requirement, no grace period)
 - Anything from any person or entity seeking to influence your decision-making is prohibited (even \$1)
 - Anything with an agreement to take official action in exchange for the gift/thing of value

Defintion of Gift

- Real property or the use of real property
- Entrance fees and tickets to events
- Travel paid by someone other than the City
- A discount or forgiveness of debt
- Food or beverage
- Membership Dues
- Flowers
- A gift given to someone else with the intent that they give it to YOU

Gift Does Not Include

- Gifts from realitives
- ☐ Gifts from your primary employer
- Items for which you pay full cost








General Definition for Conflicts of Interest



LITTLE CONFLICTS vs. BIG CONFLICTS

Voting Conflicts (Little): You can abstain from voting

Prohibitive Conflicts (Big): You either have to end private interest or cannot serve on your City board/commission





 You vote on any matter from which you, your family, employer, clients or your business associates might economically benefit or lose.


Types of Prohibitive Conflicts





Self-Dealing

Regulates public & private sides of public-private business deal



Business Connections

Work with/for entity doing Business or Regulated by The City

Prohibitive Conflicts of Interest

Legally:

- You or your family may not do business with the City (some exceptions).
- You may not have an employment or contractual relationship with a company doing business
 with your Board.

Public Opinion:

If allowable, best to have Ethics OK first!

Scenario

In your private capacity, you want to do business with another City Board or department.

Is this a conflict of interest? Yes, No, Maybe, I Don't Know?

Conflicts of Interest Self-Assessments For Boards and Commissions

Conflicts of interest may arise if there is overlap between your governmental duties and personal interests. The Ethics Office is here to help you protect yourself against the two types of potential conflicts of interest in state ethics laws:

- Prohibitive Conflicts or "Big Conflicts": These arise from contractual or business relationships with the City or your board. These could require you to give up your private interests, your board position, or the business with the City or your board. To identify potential issues, we recommend you list all of your business connections and answer the questions below.
- Voting Conflicts or "Little Conflicts": These arise when you, your relatives, employer, clients or other business associates might have a financial interest or loss in relation to a vote your board is taking. This can be cured by declaring your voting conflict and abstaining from voting.

In either case, the Ethics Office is here to help. If you are not sure what to do, please review the self-assessments below and call the Ethics Office.

To determine if you may have a prohibitive conflict of interest, please answer the following questions:

- Are you (or your spouse/child) employed by, or an officer, partner, or director of an entity either (1) doing business with or (2) receiving funds from the City of Jacksonville (including independent authorities)?
- 2. Do you (or your spouse/child) own a business or have any financial interest or ties to an entity that is either (1) doing business with or (2) receiving funds from the City of Jacksonville (including independent authorities)?
- 3. Do you engage in any consulting or contract work with a business that is either (1) doing business with or (2) receiving funds from the City of Jacksonville (including independent authorities)?
- 4. Are you (or your spouse/child) a board member (voting or non-voting) of any nonprofit or corporate entity that is either (1) doing business with or (2) receiving funds from the City of Jacksonville (including independent authorities)?





Misusing Position

- Using public position for personal gain for you, family, friends or business associates is prohibited
- Follow the same process as for every citizen
- Avoid saying, "Do you know who I am?" or "I work for the City" in order to get special favors.




Jacksonville Code

Prohibits:

- Using City time, computers, or internet for campaigns and/or fundraising
- Wearing City uniforms while campaigning (in-person)
- Campaigning, accepting or soliciting contributions in City buildings
- Distributing or posting campaign literature/ads/signs on City property

Scenario




