Meeting Summary

- 1. Call to Order/Verify Quorum: Chair Purdy called the meeting to order at 6:31 p.m. Michelle Godwin-Ware verified a quorum.
- 2. Approval of the Previous Meeting Summary: The CPAC approved the summary from the August 11th meeting.
- 3. Mayor's Staff Reports: No Report
- 4. Elected Officials: Council Member Rahman Johnson, District 14, announced that he is seeking to codify the Neighborhood Bill of Rights (NBR) and embed it into Jacksonville's Municipal Code Compliance ordinance, making the resolution legally impactful. Councilman Johnson believes there would be many benefits to codifying the NBR and expects to file an ordinance by the third quarter of 2025.

5. Guest Speaker/Presentation:

lan Clark, Senior Product Manager of Beep Inc., provided a presentation on Beep's Neighborhood Autonomous Vehicle Innovation (NAVI), the Jacksonville Transportation Authority (JTA) autonomous vehicle service. NAVI will be the nation's first fully autonomous public transportation system, launched in Jacksonville, Florida. Beep will operate and maintain the NAVI service. A fleet of 14 electric, autonomous, Buy America, and ADA-compliant Ford E-Transit vehicles integrated with Oxa's automated driving system (ADS). The vehicles will be deployed along the Bay Street Innovation Corridor, a 3.5-mile route in Downtown Jacksonville with 12 stops, spanning from the Central Business Core to the Sports and Entertainment Districts, to encourage downtown revitalization.

Jacksonville Sheriff's Office (JSO) – Lt. Russell Lloyd reported:

- All crime rates are in a downward trend. Year-to-date, crimes against persons are down 7.5%, and crimes against property have decreased by 19.12%.
- District 4 has a task force that works specifically in the district to focus on handling crime, such as recovering stolen vehicles and taking bad individuals off the street. This task force has made over 215,000 arrests, 72 misdemeanor arrests, served 90 warrants, recovered 20 stolen vehicles, seized five vehicles, 76 guns, and seized over \$21,000 in cash. This includes the seizure of drugs such as cocaine, fentanyl, and oxycodone, to name a few.

- **6. Jacksonville Fire and Rescue (JFRD)** Lt. Kwasi Dingle provided the CPAC with information regarding stroke and heart attack signs and symptoms, and how to provide Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR). In the event of an emergency, call 911 immediately.
 - The City of Jacksonville is not offering any permits to do any outside residential burning. Trash should be bagged up and placed at the curb to be collected by your trash collector. We do not recommend that residents engage in any outside burning because small fires can quickly escalate into large ones.
 - A safety checklist is available to help citizens look at little things throughout their home that may be a hazard and start a fire. Smoke detectors are an essential tool to help you escape a fire before it is too late to get out of the home. Duval County residents who own their homes may call (904) 630-2488 (CITY) to request a free smoke detector installation. If you don't own the house and are renting, contact your landlord and let them know that they can request that a smoke detector be placed in the home. The code requires it and is a requirement. If the landlord is not complying, please call JFRD, and we will do our best to accommodate you. Your safety is our top priority.

8. Staff Reports:

- Jacksonville Electric Authority (JEA) Don Tuten, Governmental Affairs, reported:
 - Don Tuten encouraged CPAC members to become familiar with the JEA website and review the Storm Center and Outage Center links. JEA will continue to use its Power Restoration 1, 2, 3 processes to quickly assess and repair service to facilities, customers, and restore isolated outages. CPAC members can visit https://www.jea.com/storm_center/power_restoration_process/ to learn more about Power Restoration 1, 2, 3. Power outages may be reported and tracked by calling (904) 655-6000.
 - Customers should download the new mobile app called "My JEA". It allows customers to manage their utility accounts from their smartphones. The app also enables users to track outages, request payment assistance, and update account information.
 - If customers are having some challenges for the month, they can request payment assistance by either calling JEA's customer center or making an appointment online to visit the customer center.
 - Every third Wednesday of the month, JEA hosts a Senior Day at the JEA Headquarters downtown. The event brings various city resources to one location. A JEA representative will also be there to assist seniors with their bills. The next event is scheduled for Wednesday, September 17, 2025, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the JEA Headquarters, located at 225 N. Pearl St. Those interested in attending may register by calling 211 or (904) 632-0600. Preregistration is encouraged but not required.
 - To minimize your risk of getting scammed by someone using JEA as a cover, please remember that JEA will never require a customer to purchase a prepaid card to pay their bill. JEA also does not take payments from Cash App, Venmo, Bitcoin, or PayPal. We will never ask for your bank information over the phone. Customers can make payments through JEA's website, through the new JEA app, by phone, by automatic bank draft, by mail, or in person. Do not open the door for someone claiming to be with JEA and stating they are there to cut off your power; instead, call the police. We will never visit your home without arranging an appointment with you in advance.

- Jacksonville Public Library (JPL) Christie Rogers, Manager for Branch Services, reported:
 - September is Library Card Sign-Up month. Residents without a library card are encouraged to obtain one free of charge, which will provide access to a variety of resources, including books, ebooks, online classes, and more.

- Municipal Code Compliance Division (MCCD) Jared Chemay, Code Compliance Supervisor, reported:
 - That the City of Jacksonville's Municipal Code Compliance Department enforces four chapters, which include property safety and maintenance, zero tolerance enforcement for rigorous signs, as well as addressing and street naming ordinances.
 - The Municipal Code Compliance Department will be happy to respond to any complaints in preparation for the hurricane season. We will address issues related to trash and debris that are on a property, as these items can become projectiles in a hurricane situation. This could include any damaged commercial signs, as well as addressing any dead or damaged trees. All issues should be reported to (904) 630- CITY (2489). Citizens are first given a warning, allowing them an opportunity to correct the problem before being issued a citation.
 - Tarps placed over a roof or windows for weatherization can only be in place for 30 days. In the event of an emergency, such as a hurricane, where the storm damages the roof or windows, the tarp can remain in place for up to six months. An extension can be filed if a legal matter prohibits the damage from being repaired within six months.
 - It is imperative that home addresses are visible from the street. It enables emergency vehicles, especially during emergencies, to reach residents.

- Public Works (PW) Jeremy Wright, Facility Manager, reported that:
 - Citywide Public Works has resurfaced approximately 30 miles of roads and mowed approximately 160,000 acres. A total of 7,500 care tickets or MyJax have been closed, and 1,900 are open.
 - A total of 33 Capital Improvement projects are active in District 4, with 15 of them in the design phase, in progress, or final review, and three are complete and under warranty period.
 - The Collins Road sidewalk project is scheduled to begin next year. The project involves constructing a new 6-foot sidewalk along the Collins Commerce Center area. The project should improve pedestrian safety.
 - Traffic upgrades are scheduled for Firestone Road and Wheat Road. A new traffic signal and a pedestrian crossing.
 - The Old Middleburg Lighting Project from Parman Road to 103rd Street is approximately 65% complete.
