WHEREAS: In Florida, 110,000 cases of breast cancer are diagnosed annually. Of

the almost 3,200 Floridians who die from breast cancer every year,

136 of them are from Duval County; and

WHEREAS: If caught early, breast cancer is often responsive to treatment.

Jacksonville is fortunate to be the home to 4 nationally-ranked medical research facilities. Jacksonville residents and visitors have access to cutting-edge treatments, therapies, and other tools to help

them win their fight against cancer; and

WHEREAS: The fight to end breast cancer would not be possible without the

support from nonprofit organizations. Organizations like the American Cancer Association and Real Men Wear Pink of the First Coast raise funds to help people diagnosed with breast cancer seek, receive, and

thrive following treatment; and

WHEREAS: Real Men Wear Pink and its partner organizations continue to rally

support for those diagnosed with breast cancer and others affected

by the disease; and

WHEREAS: One death from breast cancer is one too many. With routine

screenings, access to treatment, and community support, we can all

help win the fight against breast cancer.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, LENNY CURRY, by virtue of the authority vested in me as mayor of Jacksonville, Florida, do hereby proclaim October 5, 2022 as
