



PROCLAMATION

ONE CITY. ONE JACKSONVILLE.

WHEREAS: Dyslexia is a learning disability that can affect an individual's ability to speak, read and spell; and

WHEREAS: Dyslexia affects almost 20 percent of people in the United States. It is the most common type of learning disability; and

WHEREAS: There is no relationship between Dyslexia and intelligence. With proper support, individuals diagnosed with Dyslexia are capable of learning and mastering reading, writing, and speaking; and

WHEREAS: There are many tools available to support individuals with Dyslexia. However, the best method of intervention is early screening and detection. Early detection can ensure individuals living with Dyslexia receive the proper support, accommodations, and tools they need to be successful; and

WHEREAS: Undiagnosed Dyslexia can lead to anxiety, depression, and cause children to fall behind in school. Individuals like Aashna Shah are raising awareness in the community for the need for routine, early screening of all children for learning disabilities, including Dyslexia; and

WHEREAS: Aashna Shah has written two children books meant to educate and raise awareness of childhood Dyslexia and ADHD and continues to be an advocate for children throughout the country living with learning disabilities.


